Restore One Another

(Galatians 6:1)

The verse above reveals a frightening reality. It reveals that any disciple can get caught up in sin. This is something that we see happening constantly throughout the New Testament.

- The Christians in Galatia were warned about this (Galatians 5:4).
- Simon was guilty of allowing wickedness to corrupt his heart (Acts 8:18-23).
- Peter was guilty of hypocrisy and causing division (Galatians 2:11-14).

What are we to do when we see a brother caught up in sin? In Galatians 6:1, Paul says we are to make an effort to restore that brother.

I. It is our <u>duty (Galatians 6:1)</u>.

- A. It is the responsibility of the spiritual person.
 - 1. The spiritual person does not just include elders.
 - 2. The spiritual person does not just include preachers.
 - 3. Every <u>disciple</u> is to be spiritual (Romans 8:1-4; 1 Peter 2:5; Galatians 5:16, 18, 22-25).
- B. From this we see that Christians are to be accountable to one another.
 - 1. When we notice one another in sin, God doesn't want us to sit back and do nothing.
 - 2. Instead He wants us to help one another get back on track before it is too late!

II. In <u>spirit</u> of <u>gentleness</u> (Galatians 6:1).

- A. This does not mean...
 - 1. We are to easily brush sin aside and be passive.
 - 2. We are to be afraid to call out sin.
 - 3. We are to avoid saying certain kinds of behavior are wrong.
- B. What does this mean?
 - 1. We need to always examine our **motives**.
 - The motive for doing this must always be to help someone turn from the error of their ways (James 5:19-20). The goal must always be to speak the truth in love (Ephesians 4:15). When motives are pure and righteous, we will always do it in a spirit of gentleness.

III. We need to be <u>careful</u> (Galatians 6:1).

- A. What does Paul mean in the last part of Galatians 6:1?
 - 1. Some say this refers to carefully examining our motives before attempting to restore a brother. We need to make sure we are approaching him for the right reason.
 - 2. Others say that when restoring someone, we need to be mindful of how we would want them to approach us (Matthew 7:12).
- B. The most likely view is Paul is warning us not to get <u>drawn</u> into a brother's <u>sin</u>.

Conclusion: Do you know of someone who needs to be <u>restored</u>? What are you going to do about it before it is too late?
